## Program Evaluation Question Checklist



Note: this checklist is best suited for projects that would not be considered <u>developmental evaluation</u>.

Engagement	You engaged a variety of stakeholders in developing this evaluation question – not just the primary intended users.
Alignment with purpose	Your question clearly aligns with the evaluation's stated purpose.
Specificity	Your question is specific (i.e., it clearly identifies what aspects of the program will be examined to answer the question).
Utilization	Your question directly informs decisions about the program (e.g., how to improve or modify it, whether to continue, discontinue, expand, or reconfigure it).
Timing	Your question is appropriate for the program's stage of development (i.e., whether the program is just starting, fully developed and implemented or preparing for closure).
Ethics	Your question can be answered without putting participants through unnecessary risk, or the risk to answer your question does not outweigh the benefit to program participants.
Reasonableness	Your question is reasonable in terms of what or whom the program can influence.
Feasibility	Your question can be answered with the available resources (i.e., time, personnel, technology, funding).
	Together, your set of evaluation questions
Equity	Seeks to understand how the program contributes to decreasing or increasing inequities and inequalities within its geographical unit.
Comprehensiveness	Sufficiently addresses the evaluation purpose.
